## CANADA SUPPLIES THE UNITED NATIONS WITH FIGHTING VEHICLES

Canada's army overseas—the dagger pointed at the heart of Berlin—is said to be the most highly mechanized force in the world. This fact is not surprising because the Dominion is one of the United Nations' largest suppliers of war vehicles.

In addition to military trucks of every conceivable design, Canada is building three types of fighting vehicles: an armoured car, an armoured reconnaissance car, and an armoured scout car; two types of tanks: the Ram and the Valentine; and a tankette: the all-purpose Universal Carrier.

Massive and rugged, the Ram is a 31-ton fortress armed with a tank-killing cannon, machine guns, bomb thrower, and smoke generator. It can crush concrete cupola forts, and smash enemy positions of almost any type of structure. In spite of its great bulk, its weight is so evenly distributed that it can swing its huge mass over all sorts of obstacles, on soft and muddy terrain, and up steep inclines. This cruiser-type tank was designed by Canada's famed tank man, Major General F. F. Worthington, M.C., M.M. It is an improved version of earlier American and English medium tank designs, and has inspired new U.K. and U.S. blueprints for cruiser landships. Distinctly of Canadian design is the cast armour one-piece steel hull.

Canada is also producing the British Valentine tank, an infantry model of which a substantial number has been sent to Russia to win high praise from their Soviet users. An 18-ton machine, the Valentine is powered by a Diesel engine. It is designed specifically to co-operate with the men on foot in an assault on enemy positions, and because of its particular function, it is slower in

speed than the cruiser tank.

To provide the necessary instruments, armament, and equipment for these tanks, special Canadian factories have been created, the largest of which is a new Government-owned and operated plant employing more than 6,000 men and women on the production of optical glass, tank periscopes, and telescopes, and of other instruments for Army, Navy, or Air Force use. The entire armament for the Canadian tank is also of Canadian manufacture.

Canada is contributing her full share of thunder on wheels and tracks.
