valleys to the sea, their waters wide and deep.

Perhaps it is their romantic history. This is particularly true in the Northwest where only a little over half a century ago the rivers were the great highways. On their waters floated the canoe and bull boat of the Indian, the keel boat and barge of the fur trader and the little paddlewheel steamboat of pioneer days. It was on the rivers that the first explorers penetrated the west; Marquette and Jolliet on the Mississippi, Lewis and Clark on the Missouri, David Thompson on the Columbia, and a host of others.




