Morrison Cave

MONTANA'S newly-opened "cavern in the sky" is one of the loveliest of all caves and surely is the most spectacular in the beauty of its mountain setting.

Morrison Cave State Park, formerly the Lewis and Clark National Monument, is about 22 miles from Three Forks. The motor road climbs rapidly in a series of switchbacks to a large parking area with rest rooms and a refreshment stand. From here, the visitor walks a short distance up a wide trail to the mouth of the Cave which is located at an altitude of 5,400 feet in the Tobacco Root range of the Rockies. Far below lies a glorious panorama of the Jefferson river valley and in the distance are the rugged peaks of the Gallatin, Madison and Tobacco Root mountains.

Morrison Cave was discovered by a rancher, Dan Morrison, in 1902. In the ensuing years he partially explored and improved the cave. Since it has become a part of the public domain, much of the work was under the direction of the National Park Service. Additions have been made to the wooden stairways that descend vertical passages and other stairways have been hewn from the living rock to make the walking trip a comparatively easy one.

The temperature of the cave remains constant at about 52 degrees throughout the year, and its formations are still "growing" through the action of limestone bearing waters seeping down through the rock.

Morrison Cave consists of seven major chambers connected by passages of varying length, and descends through the mountainside a distance of about three-quarters of a mile. The cave is electrically lighted throughout its entire length and is noted for the delicacy and colorfulness of its rock formations. Every turn reveals fantastically formed stalactites and stalagmites that were hundreds of thousands of years in the making . . . weirdly convoluted passages . . . great chambers with vaulted ceilings and ghost-like "forests" of lacy spires and smoothly folded "draperies" of tinted stone.

A newly blasted tunnel enables visitors to emerge from the lowest level of the cave and walk back over a pleasant trail to the parking area.

Morrison Cave is one of the objectives of a "Heart of the Rockies" motor side trip that also includes an overnight stay at Gallatin Gateway Inn. This trip may be taken during the summer months by passengers bound east or west on the electrified Olympian.
