## USEFUL INFORMATION



**NOTICE.**—These Time Tables are subject to change without notice and passengers should apply to the Station Ticket Agent for further information as to the stopping of trains, and before purchase of tickets should inquire of Ticket Agent whether the train they desire to take stops at station to which they desire ticket.

**NOT RESPONSIBLE.**—The Southern Pacific Company does not hold itself responsible for errors in time tables, inconvenience or damage resulting from delay trains; or failure to make connections; schedules herein are subject to change without notice.

**STANDARDS OF TIME USED.**—Pacific Time is used on all Lines of the Southern Pacific except between Yuma, Ariz., and El Paso, Tex., where Mountain Time is used, and between El Paso, Tex., and New Orleans, La., where Central Time is used.

**BEFORE ENTERING THE CARS** ask the Ticket Agent, Brakeman or Conductor whether the train stops at the station to which you may be ticketed. There are stations at which some trains do not stop.

**PULLMAN ACCOMMODATIONS.**—Sleeping Car berths can be secured from the nearest Southern Pacific Agent. Southern Pacific Agents will also secure reservations beyond our lines for passengers so destined. Pullman Conductors and train employes on Southern Pacific trains will assist passengers in securing sleeping car accommodations on trains of connecting lines. Use of Upper Berth is economical, being 20% less than Lower Berth.

For exclusive occupancy of Sections, Compartments or Drawing Rooms in Standard Sleeping Cars; Drawing Rooms or Compartment in Parlor Cars; Sections in Tourist Sleeping Cars, the following minimum number of adult tickets will be required; Section, one ticket; Compartment, two tickets; Drawing Room, two tickets.

A section is an upper and a lower berth; a drawing-room contains an upper berth, a lower berth, a lounge, a private washstand and toilet annex; a compartment contains a lower and an upper berth, with private washstand and toilet.

**SPECIAL CARS.**—Chartered sleepers, special or private cars, will be hauled over these lines for twenty-five authorized adult fares, provided not more than twenty-five persons occupy a car; each person in excess of twenty-five must hold proper transportation.

**PERSONS UNABLE TO TRAVEL ALONE.**—Unless accompanied by attendants holding transportation, tickets will be refused all persons who by reason of their physical or mental disability are unable to travel alone. No tickets will be sold or transportation furnished persons suffering from contagious diseases and whose presence may constitute a menace to the health of other passengers.

**A PLAN TO ADOPT WHEN SENDING FOR A RELATIVE OR FRIEND.**—Call on the nearest Agent of the Southern Pacific Company, advise him what you want, and he will do the rest.

Upon deposit of the necessary amount, he will arrange by telegraph for delivery of ticket or tickets to whatever address is furnished without charge. Deposit may also include berth and reasonable amount of cash if desired.

The transportation will be issued via any of the available routes and all details of the journey arranged to the satisfaction of the party sent for. The depositor will be advised by wire if desired of departure of passengers in time to meet them on arrival, thus being relieved of any care, worry or expense in connection with the transaction. TRY IT.

**LIGHTED MATCHES, CIGAR BUTTS AND CIGARETTES** should not be thrown from train or out of car windows. The danger of starting fires in grass, grain or timber is great and serious damage may result.

**PASSENGERS CAN AID** in making the Safety First movement more successful—by not getting on or off moving trains; by not placing baggage or packages in the aisles for others to fall over; or not placing too large baggage or packages in the racks of cars; by not throwing bottles or other objects, or putting their heads or arms out of car windows; by seeing that open windows are securely latched before putting arms or hands on sill; by looking both ways before crossing the tracks; by not standing on or too near the tracks.

**LOST ARTICLES.**—Ticket agents will exert every effort to assist in the recovery of lost articles. Passengers should not only give a full description of the property, but should state date of loss, number of train and whether left in a coach or Pullman car.

All articles found on Southern Pacific trains are forwarded to the Superintendent of the division on which they are found.

**TICKET OFFICES** at all important stations are open thirty minutes before the departure of trains, and passengers should purchase tickets before boarding trains.

Tickets should be procured only at regular ticket offices. Numerous expired, lost, stolen or counterfeit tickets are in the hands of unauthorized persons. No responsibility attaches to a railroad company for refusal to accept such tickets for passage, and if presented, Conductors are instructed to take them up and collect fares.

**PURCHASE TICKET AT HOME.**—Improvement in station facilities are frequently based on the passenger revenue collected at that station, consequently it is to your interest to purchase tickets of your home agent whenever possible.

**LOST TICKETS.**—Railway Companies are not responsible for lost or stolen tickets, and they are no longer bulletined to conductors; therefore, all possible precaution should be taken to prevent their loss. Upon purchasing through tickets passengers should make a memorandum of the "Destination," "By what Railway issued," "Form number," "Consecutive number" and "Place and date of sale," also of the consecutive numbers of their baggage checks. This will aid in their recovery if lost or stolen.

If you lose your ticket you are out of pocket the value thereof. The railroad company is under no obligation to give you another in its place, nor to permit you to ride free. Give notice of your loss to the conductor. Pay your fare to him or purchase another ticket from first ticket station. Take conductor's or ticket agent's receipt for the amount paid. When you reach your destination write to the General Passenger Agent of the road of which you bought your ticket, enclose receipt and explain the circumstances. If your ticket is found and returned unused the company will refund your money.

**PERSONS DESIRING COUPON TICKETS** at stations where they are not regularly on sale can procure them by giving Ticket Agent sufficient notice to enable him to procure them.

**CONTRACT TICKETS** are good only for the transportation of the person whose name is indicated thereon, and are NOT TRANSFERABLE. Agents will see that original purchasers sign their own names on such tickets. Married women should be requested to sign their own legal signatures to tickets. For

instance, the signature of Mrs. John W. Smith should appear as Mary J. Smith.

Heads of families may sign names of members of their families when traveling with them, being governed by the above instructions. If party is not going to make entire trip together a ticket must be signed by each person.

**ADJUSTMENT OF FARES.**—In the event of any disagreement with the conductor concerning the tickets, privileges allowed, etc., passengers should pay the conductor's claim, take his receipt, and refer the case for adjustment to the General Passenger Agent, New Orleans, La., Houston, Texas, Los Angeles, California, San Francisco, California or Portland, Oregon. The conductor has no discretionary powers, but is governed by rules which he is not authorized to change. He will advise you to which point to apply for adjustment.

**CHILDREN'S FARES.**—Children under 5 years of age when accompanied by parents or guardians will be carried free. Children five years of age and over but under 12 years of age, are required to pay half fare. Those 12 years of age and over must pay full fare.

The law requires the passenger to pay and the railway company to collect published tariff fares for children when of sufficient age, and passengers are cautioned to purchase tickets before boarding trains for children accompanying them, thus avoiding the payment of excess fare which is always collected from adults and children when passengers board trains at stations where ticket offices are open without purchasing transportation.

**Hand Baggage in Pullmans** is restricted to what can be conveniently placed in berth or seat occupied by passenger.

### BAGGAGE REGULATIONS

Baggage consists of wearing apparel and such personal effects (money, jewelry and negotiable papers excepted) of passengers for the purpose of their journey and not intended for other persons or for sale and may be checked on presentation of valid transportation to Baggage Agent at station sufficiently in advance of departure of the train or boat to make declaration of value, permit Agent to weigh, measure and to issue the necessary checks for same. Every effort will be made to facilitate movement of baggage but no guarantee will be given for forwarding on same train with passenger nor will arrival time at destination be guaranteed.

Owing to limited space on through fast trains and on motor cars the Company does not guarantee transportation of baggage on such trains or cars and will not be responsible for any delay by reason of inability to handle baggage thereon.

Baggage must be enclosed in locked receptacles such as trunks, valises, suitcases, etc., and made of material of sufficient strength and durability and of a quality to withstand the rapid handling and piling incident to its transportation. No single piece of baggage will be accepted in baggage service weighing more than 250 pounds in weight or exceeding 72 inches in any dimension or having more than two bulging sides or with two bulging sides that are not opposite each other.

It is unlawful to place fireworks or other like explosives in baggage.

On each whole ticket 150 pounds of baggage not exceeding \$100.00 in value or 45 inches in any dimension and on each half ticket 75 pounds of baggage not exceeding \$50.00 in value or 45 inches in any dimension will be checked free. Any excess weight, value or size will be charged for in accordance with tariff regulations on file at each agency station. The value of baggage or property that is declared in excess of \$2500.00 or in excess of tariff requirements for one passenger will not be accepted.

Bicycles (not motor cycles), baby cabs, guns, club paraphernalia and similar articles as shown in tariff are subject to minimum charge as for 50 pounds excess weight baggage and value liability of \$25.00. A folding go-cart properly folded may be taken in coach if space permits.

Dogs when accompanied by passenger and not for sale or other persons, on strong leash or chain, securely fitting collar and properly muzzled may be checked subject to minimum charge as for 100 pound excess weight baggage; when placed in substantial crates the minimum charge will be as for 50 pounds excess weight baggage. Dogs with a greater declared value than \$25.00 will not be accepted. Passengers must attend to feeding and watering of dogs enroute and at station and must be claimed immediately upon arrival at destination.

Birds, cats and similar domestic pets not exceeding \$25.00 in value when in suitable crates or cages may be checked on basis of 50 pounds minimum weight baggage.

On one way tickets baggage may be checked to destination or to an intermediate point, the baggage privilege of ticket, however, being cancelled through to destination except when such intermediate point is an authorized stop over point.

Baggage may be checked direct from and to hotels and residences in certain principal cities under delivery checks, the authorized transfer companies handling and collecting their regular transfer charge when service is performed. Full information may be obtained at principal ticket offices and baggage-rooms.

Corpses may be handled in baggage service under conditions, particulars of which may be obtained from any station Agent of the Company.

If baggage is checked to a station where there is no Agent, it must be claimed by presenting duplicate check to train baggage man at baggage car door and notifying conductor before arriving at destination. If baggage is not so claimed it will be carried to next station beyond where there is an agent on duty and held pending application. The same procedure should be followed if baggage is checked to a station where agent is not on duty upon arrival of train, but in event delivery is not taken from train baggage man, such baggage will be returned to destination on first proper available train.

Storage will be charged on each piece, inbound or outbound, checked or not checked remaining on hand over 24 hours, such baggage being held at owner's risk.

Parcel rooms will be found at principal stations where hand baggage, packages etc. may be checked and cared for at nominal charge.

The Company will not be responsible for unchecked baggage or parcels left in stations or in cars.

For the passenger's own protection all baggage should bear owner's name and address in a substantial and legible manner, as the absence of such means of identification frequently results in delay and sometimes in loss of baggage, with the consequent annoyance, inconvenience and expense to the owner. # Spanish and Indian Names

### The Monterey Region, California

On December 14, 1602, Sebastian Viscaïno, Spanish explorer, discovered the Carmel River emptying into Carmel Bay, naming the stream in honor of some Carmelite priests who were with his expedition. On December 16th he rounded Punta de los Pinos (Pine Point) and landed at Monterey Bay where the city of Monterey now stands, taking possession of California in the name of the King of Spain, and naming his landing place Monterey, after his patron the Count de Monterey, Viceroy of Mexico.

On June 13, 1770, Padre Junipero Serra founded the Mission San Carlos Borromeo at Monterey but a short time afterward (July 10, 1771) the site of the Mission was changed to a point five miles east, near the banks of the Carmel River, where the Mission today stands, and is known as the Mission San Carlos del Carmelo. Near its altar are buried the remains of Padre Serra. On the original site at Monterey there stands today the old Mission Chapel San Carlos.
